Phony air controller pleads guilty to charges

Roanoke, Virginia, AP

AN out-of-work janitor who posed on radio as an air traffic controller pleaded guilty Thursday to giving pilots false information.

Rodney Eugene Bocook, 27, dubbed the "Roanoke Phantom" by controllers, told pilots to break off their landings at the last minute and change altitudes and direction.

Some pilots followed his instructions, although no flight mishaps arose because of his radio mis-

information.

"The confusion over the airwaves could ultimately have created a midair collision or other aircraft disaster," FBI agent John Butler testified. "During one departing flight, his directions, had they been believed and followed, would have caused the pilot to fly into the mountains surrounding the airport."

The airwave piracy at Roanoke Regional Airport went on for six weeks last fall before Federal Aviation Administration agents using radio receivers and directional antenna equipment tracked him down.

Bocook pleaded guilty to giving pilots false information and using profane language over the airwaves.

Bocook could be sentenced to 22 years in prison and fined up to \$250,000. Assistant US Attorney Rusty Fitzgerald estimated Bocook would serve two years under federal sentencing guidelines. Sentencing was expected within 45 days.

Air hoax disaster warning

RADIO hams posing as air traffic controllers are giving bogus instructions to pilots coming in to land at British airports.

One pilot near Luton was ordered to make a left turn at the same time his official controller was telling him to turn right. Others have heard music.

There have been seven recorded incidents so far this year — more than double the number last year. The authorities are so concerned that crews have been given special advice on how to detect hoaxers. Hams are starting to use air traffic control jargon learned from listening in.

Incident

One pilot said: "It could only be a matter of time before one of them gets it right and it could lead to a disastrous crash."

The most serious reports featured an unlicensed ham in Newcastle who pretended to be a pilot and then, on another occasion, an air traffic controller.

His bogus calls were spread across five regional airports and affected both domestic and international flights.

The authorities have been reluctant to publicise incidents for fear of encouraging copycats.

Michael Heseltine, President of the Board of Trade, has the legal backing to take tough action if any hoaxers are caught.

A Department of Trade and Industry spokesman said: "The Secretary of State will not hesitate from prosecuting anyone who is caught offending in this yery dangerous way." These stories, about "radio hams" impersonating air traffic controllers, brought the hobby into disrepute earlier in the year. I know for a fact that several people wrote to the Press Complaints Commission about them, and received just about the same reply as the R.I.S. got at 142A Walter Nash Road!

Several stories referred to "radio hams", but anyone with an ounce of intelligence would know that you don't need a licence to be a radio ham, and anyone who is a radio enthusiast could be described as such!

One of the better things to come out of the trial of George G1MTT was the radical re-think the *Radio Society of Great Britain Ltd.* had to undergo after their disreputable *Amateur Radio Observation Society (A.R.O.S.)* had failed to give evidence. The Police & Criminal Evidence Act requires disclosure of names and addresses, and *Geoff "foulface" Griffiths,* the head honcho of this band of volunteer vigilantes, fearing reprisals, had decided not to attend court, and his band of perjurious vigilantes had followed suit!

Not long after this, realising that any evidence they were to supply in future radio related prosecutions would have to be supported with their names, addresses etc., the **A.R.O.S.** was disbanded and the **R.S.G.B.Ltd.** News broadcast carried the following story:-

For many years The Amateur Radio Observation Service (AROS) actively monitored the frequencies allocated to the Amateur Services primarily to alert amateurs to unintentional mistakes in the use of facilities specified in the Terms, Provisions and Limitations booklet BR68. In recent years the role has also Included the collection of data relating to deliberate jamming and contraventions of the Wireless Telegraphy Act. AROS has a totally different role to the Intruder Watch which monitors unauthorised transmissions in the exclusive Amateur allocations. The Society wishes to acknowledge and record its appreciation for the work done by Geoff Griffiths, G3STG, and a fairly small band of observers and in recent years the assistance they have given to the Radiocommunications Agency (RA). There has been amongst the amateur community, a considerable amount of discussion on the effectiveness and approach of AROS. Council has considered this and has now decided that it is time to review the Structure and role of AROS. Consequently the current AROS organisation has been dissolved. In the meantime any urgent reports should be addressed, Care of R.S.G.B. Headquarters, to the Chairman of the Repeater Management Group or the Licensing advisory committee appropriate. A working group will be formed to examine the role of the A.R.O.S. within the Amateur Service in the light of changing technology and patterns of activity. It will examine, amongst other things, the American system of Official Observers, the issue of anonymity, and how any future organisation should interact with the authorities. (R.S.G.B.Ltd. re : COMPLAINT AGAINST THE POLICE

MANOR LANE, HALESOWEN

On the 3 July 1993 you made a witness statement to Police Constable Bloomer at Halesowen Police Station regarding the conduct of a retired police officer, Mr William Malcolm Bowden, concerning veiled threats and harassment and possible mis-use of the Police National Computer in respect of checks made on your motor vehicle. Your statement also referred to the conduct of Mr Bowden's son, who is a serving member of this Force, arising from an incident in a hairdressing shop, Manor Lane, Halesowen, the previous day.

Inspector Dickinson was appointed to enquire into the allegations (in respect of Police Constable Bowden) within the provisions of the Police (Complaints) (Informal Resolution) Regulations 1985. I understand that the Inspector, through documentation collated, was able to satisfy you that there had been no mis-use of PNC facilities and that following a discussion you indicated, in writing, that you were content to have the matter dealt with by way of Informal Resolution.

The officer concerned, Constable Bowden, was interviewed by Superintendent Dwyer, his senior officer, and the content of your complaint was fully outlined to him. He was suitably advised and gave an assurance that he would not get involved in any further dispute between yourself and his father. I understand that you intend to seek legal advice regarding harassment by Mr Bowden Snr.

I regret that you felt that you had cause to complain and I trust that this matter has now been resolved to your satisfaction.

Brian Jones (G8ASO) not only is a complete asshole, but has been given a call sign to signify this, he is often referred to as G8 ASSHOLE or something similar, and his actions live up to his sobriquet. Not often heard on 2 metres, although his use of GB3VA was recently reported, Asshole Jones confines his activities to 70Cms. We will be publishing an article in the January 1995 edition specifically aimed at the new comer to packet, and we will explain how to cheat the system, adopt the guise of another station, read anyones mail, answer anyones mail, and deny any one specific station the use of the network or deny any number of stations the use of a specific BBS or access node.

The ASSHOLE's mail can be read by changing your MYCALL to G8ASO and connecting to G87GLO. You will get a message on screen to tell you when you are connected and you will get the prompt: Next Brian> type in: L> G8ASO to read messages TO G8 ASSHOLE, or L< G8ASO to read message from him. G87GLO can be accessed directly from all midland nodes, although we suggest that you do not use 432.675MHz as this is the frequency the Asshole uses and two stations of the same call sign on the same frequency cause certain problems! More about this in Issue 1 Volume 3 in January.

Caller I.D. on B.T.

Announced in November, the B.T. call return service is completely free, and gives you the chance, with a tone 'phone, to get the number of the last caller. This service can be very useful as some of the "paraffin lamps" are in the habit of calling you up and putting the 'phone down when you answer. This seems to be the mature radio amateur's version of the children's prank of knocking on doors and then running away.

With B.T.s call return service just dial 1471 and a nice lady will tell you the number of the last caller. To completely bar YOUR number from being recorded, dial 150 and ask for the facility to be removed from your line, again, there is no charge. Well done B.T.!

Two radio enthusiasts hacked their way into police frequencies to broadcast music and dateline advertisements to Hampshire control rooms. Doxford magistrates heard the pair from Portsmouth started the broadcasts as a joke using amateur radio equipment and scanners.


Michael Roantree, 20, and Peter Taylor, 18, sent transmissions to the Isle of Wight control room and Hampshire motorway control room at Winchester. Police traced the signals to Taylor's address.

They pleaded guilty to using a transmitter without a licence and sending radio messages likely to interfere with emergency services.


Roantree also admitted two burglaries and three motoring offences and was ordered to do 60 hours community service and pay £35 compensation for damaging a car.

Taylor, who admitted receiving a radio and motoring offences, was sentenced to 50 hours community service, banned from driving, and ordered to pay £35 compensation for damaging a car.

Nigel Hodkinson, defending Roantree, said "It was a challenge to see if they could actually get into police frequencies"

Radio frequencies may be auctioned

The government is considering radical proposals for management of the radio spectrum including the possibility of holding auctions and even creating a secondary market in spectrum assignments.

The possibility of radical change came yesterday in a consultative document from the Department of Trade and Industry.

The radio spectrum is the complete range of useful radio frequencies governing everything from radio and television to mobile communications, microwave telecommunications links and satellite services.

Mr Michael Heseltine, trade and industry secretary, said yesterday that the document envisaged "an extended role for the private sector in planning the spectrum and assigning frequencies".

The Radiocommunications Agency, which assigns frequencies now, would retain responsibility for a number of core activities that had to be performed by the government.

The document comes eight years after a DTI report by consultants CSP International argued that the allocation of frequencies through licences designed to meet only the cost of regulation had led to the inefficient use of a scarce

The report suggested that the existing method of allocation should be progressively replaced by one "which gives greater scope for the operation of market forces". The DTI said yesterday that there had since been a big increase in demand on the radio spectrum.

The DTI is asking for comments on two main options for the future, administrative pricing or selective auctions.

Setting flexible fees linked to the types of frequency bands used or the efficiency of equipment would encourage users to apply for and retain only the spectrum they needed.

What the DTI describes as "a more radical approach" would involve the creation of a system of tradeable property rights in the spectrum.

Auctions could either sell parts of the spectrum direct to users or rights could be sold to private spectrum management organisation which would assign licences in either the fixed link or private mobile radio bands on a commercial basis.

Everybody had a good laugh when George G1MTT was found guilty of 5 of the 10 charges against him (50% success for the DTI!), the first to be shut up good and proper was **William Malcolm Bowden GOMAL** who was lurking about Hereford on the last day of the hearing (having been barred from the court building following certain "incidents" 1). He was heard to put a call out for lan G4SVL "G4SVL, G4SVL, this is GOMAL - I'd call G1MTT, but he hasn't got his licence anymore, ha ha ha". True to type, Bowden had little knowledge of the law and DID NOT realise that the courts have no authority over the issue of licences and as George had his radio with him, he made Bowden instantly aware of this fact, and for good measure called him a "NUTRITIONALLY, FOLICALLY, AND VERTICALLY CHALLENGED, FORNICATING SON OF A BATCHELOR, AND A PUDENDUM", or remarks of a similar character! That had, partially, the desired effect, and shut him right up - unfortunately the cardiac arrest did NOT follow, much to everyone's dismay.

The fine and cost George incurred, £9500.00 in total, were paid on the spot and the cheque writing recorded by the TV crew, this went out on the news twice that day. Everyone had a good laugh until the money started coming back in! First to capitulated was the Birmingham Evening Mail, followed a few weeks later by the Wolverhampton Express & Star. They had both published a story sent them by a free-lance, who iust happened to be a radio ham, that said the charges against George were for the use of grossly offensive language on GB3BM leading to its forced closure, when the facts were that ALL 10 charges related to the playing of music, The Laughing Policeman & The D.T.I. Song on 145.025Mhz. the input frequency of GB3MH! Faced with the facts, both papers agreed an out of court settlement and published a retraction and an apology for the defamatory statements they had made. Whilst this was going on, the R.S.G.B.Ltd. published the same story in their news broadcast of July 4th. This was also transmitted by dozens of amateurs up and down the country. Swift action was taken by George's lawyers, and after an initial dismissal of the approach, George's side indicated their intention to proceed against each individual person who had read out the defamatory and false allegations. Not only did they change their minds swiftly, they were only to pleased to discuss terms.

After a few days bargaining the final deal was struck whereby George received substantial damages, had his costs paid, and the R.S.G.B.Ltd. agreed to publish a retraction to be transmitted in the same way as every defamatory remark had been in the first place! The truth often hurts, and the packet network "spiked" the news broadcast of 22nd

August, as they did not want the grovelling apology seen by anyone! Unfortunately, this was checked and reported on by many people and George's brief, once again leapt into action as the terms of the settlement had not been met. Interestingly, all Bulletin Board licences are held by the **R.S.G.B.Ltd.** (with the exception of GB7BBS) and as such, the company should have direct control over the traffic they carry. The company had to contact each SYSOP in turn and TELL them that the August 22nd news MUST be carried, and a few days later their lawyers were in touch to check that George's side was satisfied, which they now were. This settled one part of the deformation settlement, the second part was the payment made by the way of damages. Try as we might, we cannot get George to divulge the amount, he told us "Part of the agreement was that we would not divulge the actual amount to anyone, although I would not be giving too much away to say that it was between £1000.00 and £10.000.00"

So, even with only RAE maths, you can see that the entire cost of the case was covered by damages, costs, and fees arising out of this memorable case, we say **BEST OF LUCK TO HIM!**

In our bulletin for Sunday the 4th of July, we ran a story concerning George Hitchcock, G1MTT, who had been fined for a number of radio-related offences. We stated incorrectly that the offences were related to the transmission of abuse and obscenities. We unreservedly apologise to Mr. Hitchcock for this and regret any embarrassment this may have caused him. Mr. Hitchcock has asked us to point out that the charges were as follows: - eight counts of using apparatus for wireless telegraphy without a licence and two counts of unlawful broadcasting. Four charges were withdrawn, one was returned not quilty by direction of the judge and of the five counts on which he was found guilty, four charges related to the playing of music and one related to not using a callsign at the commencement of transmission. In all cases, it was alleged the same frequency was used, namely 145.025MHz. the input frequency of the Malvern Hills repeater GB3MH. No charges were brought concerning abuse or obscenities or the use of any other repeater or frequency. The Society has agreed to pay Mr. Hitchcock his legal costs and damages

I had expected George's interview to be the highlight of the show, but even I was amazed to see what was previously only reported in the London area.

Being ever thrifty with our money, the DTI had hired a helicopter to make a "bust" on a bunch of our ethnic cousins who were transmitting from the top of a block of flats on the FM broadcast band. How they can justify this expence I just cannot imagine! To top it all an old fart from the RIS shows several transmitters he has seized in the past, pointing out how crude they are. This is another example of the DTI making grossly false statements in a similar fashion to the way they trot out the old "interference to emergency services" criticism when giving evidence about pirate broadcast radio stations! This side of the RIS/DTI was evident at George's trial when the prosecution alleged that George had transmitted on a broadcast receive FM aerial through a masthead amplifier! When confronted with a photograph of the aerial and masthead pre-amp. all RIS men withdrew from the allegation with the

exception of Roy "WALNUT FEATURES"

Ratcliffe who did his best to convince the jury that it was perfectly possibly to transmit on the wrong size aerial, through a masthead pre-amp's transistor! It makes you wonder what qualifications you need to do his job, he obviously knows little about RF, as he was under oath!


a friend when one of the alleged offenses was committed. The case was adjourned until July 8th 1993, and Mr Giles- Probert was jailed.
